A "Resilient" Clinton proposes Statehood and Superdelegates for Cyclone-Battered Myanmar.

Seeking to secure what pundits, politicians, and even her husband have openly acknowledged as an unlikely victory, Sen. Hillary Clinton (D-NY) visited cyclone-battered Myanmar today armed with a message of hope and the promise of a unicorn for each village. At a rally that attracted only a family of five Clinton spoke in strong terms about her hopes for the proposed state. "People of Myanmar," she asked, "do you want four more years of cyclones and flooding, or four years of me AND a unicorn for your village?" It was at that moment, when to the surprise of this reporter, an actual unicorn charged out of the flooded forest and stopped as Mrs. Clinton raised her arms and sung a folksong in the native Burmese tongue. She then addressed the crowd of five and laid out her plans for statehood.

Barack Obama, while surprised to learn that his opponent was campaigning in the country formerly known as Burma, congratulated the senator on her ability to call forth a unicorn at will. "I guess there is something to that notion of the 'Clinton magic'" he said sheepishly. He noted, however, that it was unlikely Myanmar would be recognized as a state and reiterated that he refused "to be drawn into the petty politics of empty promises, with or without a unicorn."
